

1                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Welcome to the March 16th  
2 meeting. I will ask Chief Paladino to lead us in the Pledge  
3 of Allegiance.

4                   \*                   \*                   \*                   \*

5                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Thank you, Chief.

6                   Good evening, everyone. With the Corona virus  
7 going on, we had restricted the boardroom to just  
8 supervisors, trying to give all our concerns to our  
9 residents for their safety. I will have a brief statement  
10 before we get into the Board meeting. It will be a very  
11 quick Board meeting, but I just have a few announcements  
12 that I think we need to get out there.

13                   Once again, I have been on the Lynbrook channel  
14 trying to get the message out about your safety, so I will  
15 just start with, as always, this Village always pulls  
16 together when we get through some rough times and it is  
17 another challenge we're being faced in this Village and we  
18 will get together and we will help each other get through  
19 it. We are a community of caring people and that is why  
20 we'll be able to do that.

21                   As developments of the Covid-19 continue to  
22 change, this Board wants to let everyone know, our Village  
23 know we are taking every preventative measure we possibly  
24 can and we are watching the CDC to utilize their advice.  
25 Everyone should listen to the sensible advice of the CDC.

1 Their website is CDC.gov. This link is posted on the  
2 Village website for easy access, it is CDC.gov. That  
3 should be your source of information. You should always  
4 refer to them; they are sensible. It is really what is  
5 happening.

6 I tend to believe some of the media is hyping  
7 this-- not to-- we're taking it very serious, don't get me  
8 wrong, but the CDC is the people that know what is going on  
9 and we should follow their advice, because I know most of  
10 you are watching and listening and hearing about the State  
11 and County closures, which is a big concern because it is  
12 happening all around us and we really, the local residents,  
13 local residents are concerned, they see their restaurants  
14 closing up. They have gone to fast food now.

15 I'm concerned as you are concerned for your  
16 family's well-being, so we're taking preventive measures  
17 throughout the Village we're making things work, to make  
18 you feel comfortable.

19 So just to review certain, several ways best to  
20 protect yourself and your family members, according to the  
21 CDC:

22 If you are ill, stay home. Wash your hands  
23 frequently with soap and water for at least twenty seconds  
24 or an alcohol based sanitizer that has at least 70 percent  
25 alcohol, if soap and water are not available. Avoid

1 touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.  
2 Avoid close contact. Keep your social distance between  
3 yourself and others at different--if you're going shopping  
4 or going to the supermarkets, try to maintain that  
5 distance. Cover your-- if you cough or sneeze, cover your  
6 mouth. Frequently clean and disinfect surfaces with  
7 household disinfectants; this includes tables, door knobs,  
8 light switches, countertops, handles, desks, phones  
9 keyboards, toilets, faucets and sinks.

10 Those individuals over the age of 60 or those with  
11 preexisting conditions, such as diabetes, heart disease,  
12 lung disease, cancer or compromised immune systems appear  
13 to develop serious illnesses more often than others. If  
14 you think you have been exposed to Covid-19 and develop  
15 symptoms of respiratory illness, fever, cough or difficulty  
16 breathing, call your health care provider immediately.

17 Our goal is to make sure you are well informed and  
18 we, as a Village, make the safest decision as possible to  
19 protect our residents and employees while we maintain  
20 services to our community.

21 At this time we have closed the library. We have  
22 canceled court after Wednesday because there is issues with  
23 the court that people will have arrest warrants that will  
24 go out for them if they don't show up at this date, so we  
25 are going to be staging people outside the building and the

1 Police Department will bring in small groups so that could  
2 be worked out within the courts. After Wednesday, court  
3 will be shut down until further notice.

4 All business transactions with the Village Hall  
5 which include Building Department, Clerk's Office and the  
6 Village Court must be done by mail or Internet. For  
7 special accommodations and additional information call  
8 Village Hall 516 599-8300.

9 The weekly senior bus to the market has been  
10 suspended. Those members of the Lynbrook Senior Club that  
11 rely on the bus to the market while we had coordinated with  
12 Keyfood Supermarket for a grocery delivery. Please contact  
13 Keyfood after 10:00 A.M. at 516623-2560 to make  
14 arrangements. The cost of delivery is \$8.99 and is only on  
15 a cash basis.

16 Again, with issues involving health, residents  
17 should contact their medical professionals immediately. In  
18 the event of an emergency call 911. We have posted  
19 additional contact addition on Lynbrook T.V. and the  
20 Village website.

21 Community Cares, Laura Ryder is running that with  
22 Steve Schmidt. They're available to help our seniors. If  
23 you are homebound and you need the assistance, please reach  
24 out to the Mayor's Office at 599-8300, extension 201.

25 Be safe, be well and we'll keep you up-to-date as

1 things happen. I'll be sending messages out via e-mail or  
2 over the phone, like you received today.

3 This is a tough time for all of us. It is very  
4 awkward to see our restaurants and things shut down, but  
5 we'll get through this and we'll work together to see it  
6 work out for all of us. Hang in there and be Lynbrook.  
7 We'll be good. And with that we'll start with the Board  
8 meeting.

9 First on the agenda is the minutes of March 2nd.  
10 I need a motion to approve the minutes.

11 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: So moved.

12 TRUSTEE REARDON: Second.

13 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: All in favor.

14 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: Aye.

15 TRUSTEE REARDON: Aye.

16 TRUSTEE BECKER: Aye.

17 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Chamber of Commerce is not here.

18 Department of Reports. I will go through some of  
19 supervisors that are here to give you some information that  
20 is going on in your village. I will ask, please, Chief  
21 Paladino to get up first, please.

22 CHIEF PALADINO: Good evening, Board. Good  
23 evening, everyone.

24 Yes, we're having some tough times and this is  
25 nothing that have been very in our history of the Village

1 and our country overall, however, we need to go on and the  
2 Police Department will always be there for you, as well as  
3 the Fire Department and all the Village services.

4 I just want to given everyone a heads up.  
5 Ambulance runs that we do respond to, unless there is an  
6 active wound or injury or a trauma or cardiac event or  
7 something like that, we will be waiting outside; if it is  
8 more of a situation where someone is sick. We're trying to  
9 reduce as many people being exposed to the public as  
10 possible. And ambulance crews will be donning some massive  
11 gear that looks like something out of a sci-fi movie and it  
12 is really just to protect themselves. It is an over  
13 abundance of caution, which is necessary at the moment.

14 A few things that I came across today, one, which  
15 we've been very, questioned about was the closing of gyms,  
16 movie theaters and restaurants and bars by 8:00 P.M. today.  
17 That has gone into effect. Restaurants are now supposed to  
18 be doing curbside service. We're going to remind people  
19 and assist the restaurants in setting up places to do their  
20 curbside service if they chose to operate in that manner so  
21 we'll be in all the restaurants tonight and we're going to  
22 just take a poll and see where the heartbeat of these  
23 restaurants are sound.

24 Village Hall and all the buildings are going to be  
25 very limited access. We actually stationed someone at the

1 front of Village Hall and prior to you coming into the  
2 building you'll be interviewed whether you are sick and  
3 whether really you need to be in there. So all the  
4 departments are requesting that we try to do anything  
5 telephonically, electronically or by mail before having to  
6 come in. And if you have to come in and feeling ill, we  
7 either are going to bar you or have give you a mask to wear  
8 into the building. But we're trying to lower contact with  
9 the community as best as possible.

10 As I said, with strange times happening, we may be  
11 asked to do different things. Different buildings may be  
12 converted. We had stories of hotels that may be converted  
13 into hospital beds, but this is all in preparation for  
14 worse case scenarios. Hopefully we won't have to get to  
15 that point, but we ask everybody, you know, stay inside,  
16 stay away from everyone, keep your social distancing will  
17 probably be the safest bet we could have right now.

18 On a different note, I just, off topic a little  
19 bit from Corona virus, I really want to give a heads up, a  
20 big shout out to our Detective Unit. We have three  
21 detectives downstairs that actively work on a lot of cases.

22 We had a particular bad month with, we had in  
23 December and January we had two Chinese food robberies,  
24 Chinese food delivery persons that were robbed and we also  
25 had Lynbrook bike shop was broken into twice. In both of

1 those cases there were two crimes committed by the same  
2 groups of youths, and all the youths have been round up and  
3 arrested for those situations, and it was really, it was  
4 great work by the detectives putting together video  
5 footage, facial recognition software and using interviews  
6 and talking to different subjects. And we got a lot of the  
7 property back in the bike thefts and we got to the bottom  
8 of a lot of it. It was a crime pending and it was a bad  
9 situation that we had.

10 Furthermore, tonight they apprehended a man who,  
11 we a female lead with a relationship and things were not  
12 going that great and she had a man in and out of her life  
13 and he severely beat her a couple of weeks ago and didn't  
14 admit to the fact it was him. Our detectives had a hunch  
15 it was this man that was in and out of her life and got to  
16 talk to her, got her the right service and she made a full  
17 confession and was able to testify against the person, and  
18 we placed him under arrest tonight. So our detectives, I  
19 could never thank them enough. I ask for a situation that  
20 happens, a bad signal goes up and I could ask them and they  
21 really, really come through for us in a lot of ways, and  
22 along with my other cops that do a lot of legwork and help  
23 them out, but they really work well together.

24 With that I'm pretty much done. If anybody has  
25 any questions, I could further go--



1 TRUSTEE BECKER: I have one question. In case a  
2 resident doesn't have a medical doctor and they feel they  
3 should be tested, you have any advice?

4 CHIEF PALADINO: As of now, tests are still at a  
5 minimum. And even with that ambulance response that we're  
6 talking about, they may not take this person to the  
7 hospital because the last person, the last place they need  
8 to be is in a hospital because they will infect the  
9 ambulance, will infect maybe people at the hospital. What  
10 they're doing is metering every response and Northwell has  
11 the protocols and they being the medical professionals,  
12 they make a judgment whether they're going to take the  
13 person or not. If they believe the person should be  
14 tested, if it is a severe enough situation where they think  
15 they should be tested, the Board of Health would actually  
16 quarantine them and-- not quarantine, take them to the  
17 hospital, quarantine them at the hospital and get them a  
18 test. But as of now, their prescription is to basically,  
19 if someone is exhibiting signs, to self-quarantine.

20 Now that tests are becoming more available, they  
21 will make available tests on a priority basis for people  
22 they think deserve it more or show better signs of having  
23 it. And more testing should be under way as of Thursday  
24 at Jones Beach State Park. What will happen, there will be  
25 two criteria. They will need a prescription and they'll

1 need to have make an appointment who be hopefully tested.

2 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: You are saying up to 6,000  
3 vehicles a day.

4 CHIEF PALADINO: It will be really, they are  
5 going to need the amount of tests to accommodate, but it is  
6 a great parking lot, a great situation in that respect.  
7 But you just can't get the car and go down, it is going to  
8 have to be an appointment and you are going to need a  
9 prescription from a doctor to be tested. So those two  
10 criteria will allow you to get tested down at Jones Beach.

11 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Thank you.

12 TRUSTEE BECKER: One last thing, Chief.

13 CHIEF PALADINO: Sure.

14 TRUSTEE BECKER: Obviously, this is an extremely  
15 scary time for all of our residents; a lot of uncertainties  
16 and in general very scary and I know we're very proud of  
17 our Police Department here. You guys do a great job, you  
18 as the lead do a great job. I'm sure we are keeping all of  
19 our regular rotations with the Police Department?

20 CHIEF PALADINO: Yeah, right now, just this part  
21 of the year even particularly, it is never a heavy vacation  
22 part of the year or anything like that, so we're fully  
23 staffed. And also report, Officer Quinlan, who was struck  
24 by a vehicle back in November, he's coming back to work  
25 tomorrow, so we're actually at full staff. But we're well

1           staffed and everything is going well. Thank you.

2                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH:       Kudos to the guys. Thank you  
3           very much.

4                   Mr. Stanton, tell us what is going on in the  
5           Building Department through this Corona virus.

6                   MR. STANTON:    You touched base by saying that you  
7           would have to call first. I just want the residents and  
8           contractors to know, please call 599-8828 before you decide  
9           to come down. As, at this time, for everyone's safety  
10          we're not having people come into the Building Department.  
11          Building permits would have to be filed and mailed.  
12          Applications could be done electronically. Some of these  
13          applications are on the Village website, some are due to  
14          the nature of the actual permit.

15                   If you call the Building Department, we will mail  
16          you out whatever is necessary for whatever project you have  
17          coming forward. We're there to help you, but we are just  
18          doing this to keep everybody safe.

19                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH:   One question. Do we have the  
20          forms on our website that people could access them through  
21          our website?

22                   MR. STANTON:    As I said, we have multiple amounts  
23          of applications, different ones that are online, so we  
24          don't do online due to the legal size of it and everything  
25          else in the process. But any resident or contractor that

1 is watching this, we will mail you out whatever  
2 applications that they can't ascertain through the Village  
3 website.

4 We're there to help them and tell them how the  
5 procedure will work to get the application in and we'll  
6 work it up just like normal, and we'll mail it out to them  
7 when it is complete.

8 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Thank you.

9 MR. STANTON: The other part, I will just take a  
10 second to ensure the safety of our residents and  
11 contractors, anyone who is watching us. I'm going to  
12 request that when our inspectors do a field inspection on  
13 an internal part of the house, to limit the contractor only  
14 in the area that they're going to. So we just request for  
15 the safety of the property owners and other people, line  
16 inspectors need to be with the contractor themselves in the  
17 area of inspection that is needed. Whether it is the  
18 basement first floor, less people involved in that  
19 inspection is safer for everybody, our inspectors and the  
20 property owners themselves.

21 So the protocol will be when we set up an  
22 inspection, that if there is other people in the family,  
23 whether there is children and this and that, we try to keep  
24 people separated as much as possible as the work is being  
25 performed on the inspection.

1                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Good point. Thank you.

2                   Mr. Healy, our DPW.

3                   MR. HEALY: Thank you, Mr. Mayor.

4                   DPW will continue, as far as recycling and  
5 sanitation, we will continue to provide that service and  
6 all the other services we provide for the maintenance of  
7 our infrastructure. We will still be continuing as best we  
8 can, as long as -- right now everybody is healthy and fit  
9 and we plan on continuing all of our services. You may see  
10 them on a little bit different time of day that you are  
11 used to seeing them, recycling and sanitation trucks,  
12 because we're staggering the starts of the crews to have  
13 less contact with each other. But besides that, we'll  
14 still be collecting. If you have a question, give us a  
15 call, as always.

16                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: You'll still be doing special  
17 pickups?

18                   MR. HEALY: Special pickups, everything. All  
19 services will continue as long as we are able. And we'll  
20 also have crews disinfecting municipal buildings on a daily  
21 basis to make everything is as good as possible.

22                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Great. Should I say something  
23 about Arbor Day?

24                   MR. HEALY: I was going to say something. Thank  
25 you, Members of the Board.

1           Arbor Day is only six days a week and everybody is  
2 thinking about that, and we have a special for our first  
3 time customers on Arbor Day this year when they come down  
4 on Friday, the last Friday in April. We do have extra  
5 trees we've been cultivating.

6           MAYOR ALAN BEACH: When you say come down, we're  
7 requesting people not to come down.

8           MR. HEALY: You could come down, but just don't  
9 come in the building and we'll meet you out there.

10          MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Good.

11          MR. HEALY: In the morning we'll have about a  
12 hundred pine trees we've cultivating for three years in  
13 pots.

14          MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Very nice.

15          MR. HEALY: And that was it. Something we got  
16 from the Saratoga Nursery up in D.C. and it's time to move  
17 them out to the community.

18          MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Very nice.

19          MR. HEALY: Hopefully, we'll have a little Arbor  
20 Day celebration.

21          MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Happy things.

22          MR. HEALY: Happy things still growing in  
23 Lynbrook.

24          MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Thank you very much, Mr.  
25 Healy.

1                   Keith from the Rec, Andrea, would you like to come  
2 down or is one just necessary?

3                   MR. BONOMO: We have been bleaching everything  
4 down and cleaning the inside and outside. Kids a still  
5 coming to the park, so we're pretty much good on  
6 everything.

7                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: We're maintaining the  
8 playground open, correct?

9                   MR. BONOMO: Yes.

10                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: And everything is being wiped  
11 down frequently?

12                  MR. BONOMO: Yes, inside the bathrooms, everything  
13 is being cleaned with bleach solution.

14                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: We are restricting entrance  
15 into the Recreation Center?

16                  MR. BONOMO: You could only access the bathrooms  
17 in the Rec right now.

18                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: They're being cleaned?

19                  Mr. BONOMO: Hourly.

20                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Okay. And everything is being  
21 wiped down. I need that to be out there to the residents  
22 knowing.

23                  MR. BONOMO: Everything is wiped down and sprayed  
24 down with bleach and cleaned. You would laugh at the stuff  
25 we're cleaning. I'm cleaning the keys today whatever we

1 touch.

2 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Okay. Andrea.

3 MS. JENNA: Good evening. If anyone would like  
4 to send in their pool application, I'm collecting them  
5 until March 31st through the mail. We put the details up  
6 on our Facebook page. If you are a new applicant, you  
7 could send in copies of the birth certificate. You could  
8 also print out the applications, which are on the Lynbrook  
9 Village Pool website for you to be able to send in your  
10 early for registration.

11 We are also still accepting spring registrations,  
12 even though we're not sure what we're doing, but we're  
13 still accepting them. We have people registering for  
14 different programs today, and if you have any questions,  
15 you could call the Rec Center 516 599-8000, or you could  
16 also e-mail me at AJenna, J-E-N-N-A @LynbrookVillage.com.

17 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Thank you very much. Thank  
18 you.

19 So we're off to the next. Just as we just finish  
20 up, just remember, stay calm. We're going to be fine here.  
21 Just, everybody relax. When you go to the supermarket  
22 don't worry about that last carton of milk. There will be  
23 more milk. If you go to Cross Island Fruits, the place is  
24 packed 8 o'clock in the morning. Just stay calm. We'll be  
25 fine.



1                   Next on the agenda is a proclamation/citation.  
2                   This is a nice thing. Unfortunately, we have a situation  
3                   of the virus and it is a birthday for Mr. Giordano, who was  
4                   90 years old on February 28th. It would have been nice if  
5                   we, as seniors, we are concerned about them so we asked  
6                   them to stay isolated.

7                   But Mr. Giordano, Phil Giordano is 90 years old.  
8                   He's been residing in Lynbrook for 60 years. He married  
9                   his high school sweetheart, Gloria for 65 years. God  
10                  bless. He served in the Korean War in the army. He's a  
11                  member of the VFW, a member of the Peninsula Golf and an  
12                  avid bowler.

13                  By the way, everybody who put it together, this is  
14                  John's dad, which is really very nice. I'm also told he's  
15                  the good Giordano because he left Inwood and came to  
16                  Lynbrook, but unfortunately, he couldn't be here. But I  
17                  would like to read the citation.

18                  It is alleged, "Let it be known the Mayor and the  
19                  Board of the Incorporated Village of Lynbrook do hereby  
20                  recognize Philip Giordano on this occasion of his 90th  
21                  Birthday on February 28, 2020, and also known as Yaitsy  
22                  Day." That is his nickname, Yaitsy.

23                  "You have seen many changes in the world of your  
24                  90 days and certainly enjoyed the fruits of a long and  
25                  productive lifetime in which you have earned the utmost

1 respect and affection of countless people throughout your  
2 life's travels and be it further known we deem it an honor  
3 and truly do, you gave us a great son to work with us."

4 Thank you very much. And it's my pleasure to  
5 extend this citation to you on your 90th birthday and we  
6 offer our sincere congratulations and best wishes for good  
7 health and happiness in the years ahead.

8 Mr. Giordano, Happy Birthday. I will hold it up  
9 so you could see it at home.

10 The Fire Department. Next on the agenda is the  
11 Fire Department.

12 The department requests for June 17th and 19th,  
13 and July 19th and September 19th.

14 We spoke earlier about restricting.

15  
16 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: At this time we have to  
17 restrict all travel from the Village. You know, really, it  
18 is not necessary travel so at this time we will be  
19 restricting all travel of Village employees, so at this  
20 time I don't think we can approve any travel until things  
21 change.

22 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: I will table this until  
23 further notice.

24

25 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: I think they should be--

1 don't make any reservations, don't put anybody down. The  
2 Wounded Warrior event is one thing that is a tremendous  
3 event that Kevin Beane and Steve Grogan run. September,  
4 hopefully, I'm hopeful we'll be okay. The first two  
5 events, especially with the concern with the beach ball and  
6 delaying the start, I don't know if they're going to  
7 happen.

8 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: I'll make a motion to table it  
9 until further notice.

10 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: Yes, so moved.

11 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Second. All in favor?

12 TRUSTEE REARDON: Aye.

13 TRUSTEE BECKER: Aye.

14 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Next on the agenda is the  
15 parking on Forest Avenue for Lynbrook High School.

16 Lynbrook High School will be starting-- I don't  
17 know if they have started their construction on the new  
18 wing they're putting up on the school and there will be  
19 many students displaced that drive their vehicle, so I was  
20 asking that we could possibly relocate those cars to Forest  
21 along side the railroad tracks, where I think we would give  
22 them six-hour parking.

23 Chief, could you get up and help with this? I  
24 remember that we spoke about it and I think, I don't have  
25 that information in front of me.

1 CHIEF PALADINO: The way we would-- it will be a  
2 pilot program until the end of the school year. This  
3 construction project, it didn't actually begin today, and  
4 it will go through till, estimated to go through the year  
5 of, to be completed in 2022, June of 2022 or earlier than  
6 that.

7 In respect, in that respect we are going to lose  
8 all of the parking that is along Union Avenue on the west  
9 side of Union Avenue, the length of the field which would  
10 probably be about 20, 25 cars daily. I don't want to lift  
11 any time restrictions in front of the people's houses along  
12 the side streets; they put up enough with the time  
13 restrictions being there. They have a lot of congestion  
14 with the student parkers and various faculty who have to  
15 use the street to park sometimes and there are a couple of  
16 businesses there, as well, a dentist office that uses the  
17 area as well for parking.

18 So we researched different areas and what we saw  
19 what was wide open is pretty much Forest Avenue, the length  
20 of the railroad, but we, more or less there are some free  
21 parking spaces, if you will, and metered spots that  
22 students can use. So what was suggested is what I  
23 suggested to the school is that you issue as many permits  
24 as you want because we're really going to have an overflow  
25 of about 30 cars, and if people could go to the school and

1 if they want to see if they could get a better spot at  
2 first, if not, alternative parking location would be along  
3 Forest Avenue.

4 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Those flyers are only  
5 restricted for Forest Avenue.

6 CHIEF PALADINO: These, putting these in -- a  
7 student putting them in the windshield would allow our  
8 parking people to know they're with the high school and  
9 we're not going to enforce the six-hour parking on them.  
10 Chances are they are not going to park more than six hours,  
11 however, when people commuters sees there are cars parking  
12 there, they will start to take advantage and they will  
13 extend the six-hour parking rule, and nobody wants to lose  
14 their space for the people that are supposed to use the  
15 high school and I don't want people taking advantage of the  
16 fact we're giving high school parking. So the permit is  
17 really-- of course, a child goes to school, they have an  
18 after school activity, they're not going to get a ticket.  
19 However, it is more to tell us who is there from the high  
20 school and who is not. If are not there from the high  
21 school and you don't have a parking permit and you exceed  
22 the six-hour rule then we will be ticketing your car. So  
23 we're trying to curtail commuter parking in that area.

24 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Perfect. Thank you, that will  
25 work out fine for us and work out fine for the kids. There

1 is always an issue with -- my kids went there too and there  
2 was a ticket here and there, so if we can -- so I need a  
3 motion to accept.

4 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: So moved.

5 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Second.

6 TRUSTEE REARDON: Second.

7 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: All in favor, aye.

8 TRUSTEE BECKER: Aye.

9 TRUSTEE REARDON: Aye.

10 TRUSTEE BECKER: Since there is going to be parking  
11 on Forest, obviously, the crossing guard is going to have  
12 traffic over there, so I don't know if there--

13 CHIEF PALADINO: No, there is no crossing guard  
14 at that location.

15 TRUSTEE BECKER: I hope they will walk down to  
16 Atlantic.

17 CHIEF PALADINO: There is no crossing guard at  
18 Lincoln, and there is actually new pedestrian --

19 TRUSTEE BECKER: We wouldn't them crossing at  
20 Forest and Sunrise.

21 CHIEF PALADINO: That seems to be the logical  
22 way. They will be south of Forest, so logically they will  
23 be going down Lincoln Place toward the high school, that  
24 way, the school, as well this is not going to be a mass  
25 parking and pedestrian problem at all.

1                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Now we have the public hearing  
2 for the Community Development Block Grant. I'll open the  
3 public hearing at, is it 8:37, for the Board to have  
4 comments. This is a grant that we applied for through the  
5 County, is it, John?

6                   MR. GIORDANO: Yes, Mayor.

7                   MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Any comments from the Board?

8                   DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: No.

9                   TRUSTEE REARDON: No.

10                  TRUSTEE BECKER: No.

11                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: So then I will make a motion to  
12 accept the Grant. Actually, I have to close the public  
13 hearing because there is no more at 8:38 and have a motion  
14 to accept the Grant, the Block Grant.

15                  DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: So moved.

16                  TRUSTEE BECKER: Second.

17                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: All in favor.

18                  DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: Aye.

19                  TRUSTEE REARDON: Aye.

20                  TRUSTEE BECKER: Aye.

21                  MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Next is Bills.

22                  I move the bills that are listed in the abstract  
23 of the vouchers be approved as soon as they have been duly  
24 ordered by the majority.

25                  DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: So moved.

1 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: Second?

2 TRUSTEE REARDON: Second.

3 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: All in favor.

4 TRUSTEE REARDON: Aye.

5 TRUSTEE BECKER: Aye.

6 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: Aye.

7 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: With that I will conclude the  
8 meeting and I'll just say remain calm. We'll be fine, just  
9 be very patient with our environment and keep your social  
10 distance and enjoy life. It is little awkward for us all,  
11 but we'll be all right. Just stay calm. Good night and be  
12 safe.

13 I need a motion to close.

14 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: So moved.

15 TRUSTEE BECKER: Second.

16 MAYOR ALAN BEACH: All in favor.

17 TRUSTEE REARDON: Aye.

18 TRUSTEE BECKER: Aye.

19 DEPUTY MAYOR HAWXHURST: Aye.
