Dear Residents:



Lynbrook Leads the Fight for Access to Natural Gas

Lynbrook Mayor Alan Beach and business owners have joined forces to decry a natural-gas moratorium that is hurting Lynbrook businesses and the local economy.

During an August 7th rally under the Long Island Rail Road trestle at Atlantic and Stauderman Avenues, Mayor Beach, Deputy Mayor Mike Hawxhurst, and Village Trustees AnnMarie Reardon and Robert Boccio, along with Nassau County Legislator William Gaylor and Town of Hempstead Councilman Anthony D'Esposito, emplored National Grid, the state Department of Environmental Conservation, and New York and New Jersey to support Lynbrook's businesses and homeowners by permitting new gas hook ups.

National Grid declared a moratorium on gas hook ups because an application for a \$1 billion, 24mile gas supply pipeline (the Northeast Supply Enhancement Project) was rejected by New York and New Jersey in May, causing new and expanding businesses, construction, and private home requests for gas to be placed on hold not only for Lynbrook but for 40 business districts in Nassau and Suffolk counties.

Capri Redevelopment

Further to Mayor Beach's community-informed efforts to bring potential redevelopment to Lynbrook, an informational session regarding proposed deluxe luxury apartments replacing the Capri Motor Inn was held on August 20th.

Hosted by developer Terwilliger & Bartone Property's managing partner Anthony Bartone. residents were provided with the opportunity to discuss plans and provide feedback on what they

the plans for the site are submitted.

The redevelopment of the 5 Freer Street/Roxy Place site is a work in progress to allow time for the proper outreach to residents and appropriate response to the village's request for proposal, which was issued in 2016.

In July, the village received notification from Terwilliger & Bartone of their intent to enter into a purchase and sale agreement to

want and do not want to see when acquire the Capri Motel, demolish the existing hotel, and redevelop the site. Immediately following the written notification, a copy was posted on the village website and the informational session was scheduled.

"I, along with the village board, made a promise to the residents of Lynbrook to do everything in our power to address the decades old concerns regarding the Capri Motor Inn which we have. Now, the Village Board would like to in-

vestigate if there exist an opportunity for development at the location which fits with the character of Lynbrook while also providing new revenue to stabilize our tax base," stated Mayor Beach.

The sale is contingent on the village's approval of Bartone's plan (see lynbrookvillage.net) to be considered after a public hearing tentatively scheduled for October 21st.

Leg. Gaylor Gets County Roads in **Lynbrook Repaved!**

Cold weather will be here before we know it and our roads are getting a facelift that will be sure to lessen the wear and tear on our cars. Lynbrook's own, County Legislator C. William Gaylor III has announced completed and upcoming road improvements that will be happening in Lynbrook.

Already, Atlantic Avenue from Sunrise Highway north to Merrick Road and Hempstead Avenue from Merrick Road to Peninsula The work consisted of milling and repaying the entire roadways. Scranton Avenue from Atlantic Avenue to Peninsula Boulevard will be completed later this year.



Legislator Gaylor also announced the upcoming road improvements for next year, including: Franklin Avenue from the LIRR tracks to Hendrickson Avenue/Hempstead Avenue; Broadway from Prospect Avenue to Sunrise Highway; Lakeview Avenue from Hempstead Avenue to Ocean Avenue; Scranton Avenue from Horton Avenue to Peninsula Boulevard; and Atlantic Avenue from Main Street to Sunrise Highway.
