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Mayor's Message

These have certainly been trying times in our village, the greater metropolitan area and across the globe. Many of us have felt a mixture of emotions over the past couple months as our way of living has dramatically transformed in order to enable those in our hospitals and health care facilities on the front lines to battle the virus. They are supported by first responders ensuring the safety of our communities and by the essential workers keeping the basics of our economy functioning. Lynbrook is home to many of these workers and I join with all our residents in thanking them for all that they have done and continue to do.

We have also been doing our part here at Village Hall to ensure continuity of services while activating modified working arrangements in accordance with guidance from our federal and state partners. Our public works, fire, police, and various other departments have made the necessary accommodations to maintain operations in a safe and sound manner while ensuring most services can continue operating remotely or online. While we have unfortunately had to temporarily close our library and recreation programs that our residents take great pride in, we hope to have them running again soon when we meet the criteria for reopening.

We have been communicating with the Federal Emergency Management Agency on a weekly basis regarding reimbursement of Covid-19 related expenses to the village, as well as with Congresswoman Kathleen Rice, the Small Business Administration and officials from the Town of Hempstead and Nassau County. We are engaged with our local business community and focused on getting our business district reopen when permitted, while looking at ways to support them by fast-tracking certain accommodations, including outdoor dining, which commenced on June 12th.

The village has also supported state legislation to temporarily waive late fees on real estate taxes and enact federal programs to reimburse municipalities for lost revenue. Emergency budget provisions were adopted to minimize impacts to local taxes knowing that the coronavirus is resulting in lost revenues for our village. In addition to robo calls to our residents, we have rolled out a new website that features the latest information on village updates and have begun to broadcast our board meetings live on YouTube for those who are home-bound. 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Board Passes 2020-2021 Village Budget

With the coronavirus pandemic consuming much of its attention for the past three months, on May 11th Mayor Alan Beach and the Lynbrook village board passed the 2020-2021 budget by a 4 to 1 vote. The \$43.1 million-dollar budget fell under the tax cap.

One year after passing the 2019-2020 budget that did not raise taxes for village residents, the 2020-2021 budget included a 2.25 percent tax increase. According to village officials, the tax increase was a direct result of a considerable loss in village revenues due

to the coronavirus pandemic. Initially, the board was faced with a \$44.5 million-dollar budget which would have resulted in raising village taxes by 9.4 percent.

With the sole intent to reduce any village tax increase in this unprecedented period, Mayor Beach and the board crafted a budget that cut spending and expenses that also applied funds from the village reserves. Expense reductions contained in the final budget included capital improvement costs and summer seasonal employees. However, vices offered by the Lynbrook Library, Department of Public Works, Lynbrook Fire Department and the Lynbrook Police are continued through 2020-2021.

"The Coronavirus caused economic chaos not only for the Village of Lynbrook but more importantly for some of our residents with the possibility of loss of employment. As a result, Mayor Beach and the board's primary concern in the budget process was limiting any tax increase for our residents while ensuring the continuation of essential vil-

the budget assures that all existing ser- lage services at the highest quality level. While none of the board members wanted to cut seasonal summer hires which are basically Lynbrook kids or cutting back on the village's capital improvement program, the majority of the board wanted to pass a budget with the lowest possible tax increase in these troubling and uncertain times," stated Deputy Mayor Michael Hawxhurst who is also the Village Finance Liaison.

Lynbrook Swears in its 100th Fire Chief

On April 21st, Mayor Alan Beach swore in Michael Brooks, who became the 100th Chief of the Lynbrook Fire Department. Chief Brooks assumes the leadership of the Department from outgoing Chief Nick Pearsall.

Brooks first joined the Lynbrook Fire Department as a Junior fireman in 1995 at the age of 13. Since joining Hose Company No. 1 in 2000, Brooks has served as captain for two terms. For the past three years, Brooks was elected assistant fire chief of the Lynbrook Fire Department.

Chief Brooks is married to his wife, Elizabeth and has two daughters, Allison and Sophia. Brooks is also a 16-year employee of the Lynbrook Department of Public Works. Chief Brooks comes from a family with a long history in the Lynbrook Fire Department including his grandfather, Walter Brooks, serving as Chief of the Fire Department in 1972.

Village Trustee Ann Marie Reardon, who serves as the Village Board Liaison to the Fire Department stated, "On behalf of the Mayor and the Board, as well as all of the residents of Lynbrook, I would not only like to congratulate Chief Brooks on becoming the 100th Fire Chief in the history of our village but I would also like to thank him and all of the volunteers of the LFD for their service and commitment to our community."

Along with Chief Brooks, Mayor Beach also swore in three assistant chiefs: First Assistant Chief John Donald of Truck Company, Second Assistant Chief Chris Kelly of Engine Company and the newest chief, Third Assistant Danny Ambrosio of Vulcan Company.


Honoring Our Heroes

Remembering **Alicemarie Bresnihan**

On May 11th, Alicemarie Bresnihan passed away after a battle with cancer at age 85.

Alicemarie was a champion for all things Lynbrook since first being elected to the Lynbrook Board of Education in 1975. During her 45 years' tenure she served as both as a board member and as Board President, lobbying in Albany and Washington D.C. on behalf of the district as a member of the school board's Audit and Policy committees.

Alicemarie and her husband John moved to Lynbrook in 1959. They raised nine children all of whom graduated from Lynbrook High School, and was blessed with twenty-one grandchildren. Professionally, Alicemarie worked as a Nassau County Probation Officer retiring in 2003.

The Village recognized Alicemarie's commitment to Lynbrook and its children by naming her Citizen and Woman of the Year.

Former New York State Assemblyman and Lynbrook Mayor Brian Curran stated, "Alicemarie was one of the sweetest and kind hearted person I ever had the pleasure of meeting. She dedicated her life to ensuring that Lynbrook students received the very best education. She loved Lynbrook schools and every child that attended them. Lynbrook truly lost a big part of its community heart with Alicemarie's passing. "
