
Mayor's Message

We Honor Those We Lost Fallen Firefighters









The Lynbrook Fire Department and the Lynbrook Village Board remembered those firefighters that we have lost at the annual memorial service at Firefighters Memorial Park on Sunrise Highway on October 17th.

Early Immigrants







Members of the Nassau County Ancient Order of Hibernians and the Historical Society of East Rockaway and Lynbrook gathered in the Rockville Cemetery on Merrick Road in remembrance of the 215 victims of two early 19th-century shipwrecks. In 1837, the Bristol and the Mexico, containing mostly Irish immigrants, shipwrecked off the South Shore of Long

Island. 139 men, women, and children were buried in a mass grave in the Rockville Cemetery.

The site's **Bristol** and Mexico Monument serves as a reminder to future generations of the sacrifices and risks early immigrants made. The ceremony was led by Art Mattson, the Lynbrook village historian, and Jack O'Brien, president of the NC-AOH.

Library Board President Regina A. Flaherty

was dedicated to Regina A. Flaherty. Regina was appointed to the Library Board in September 1995, becoming Board President in 1999, a position she held until her passing. Regina loved the small-town feel Robyn Gilloon.



Recycling Being Phased Out Nationally

Global enviromental market conditions have reversed the pratice of recycling.

For over 10 years, Lynbrook has been implementing a "Waste to Energy" or Bio-Mass program, an environmental solution to municipal solid waste (MSW, or often called garbage) disposal, where plants burn municipal solid waste to produce steam in a boiler that is used to generate electricity in an environmentally safe manner. As a result, you can put more waste in the garbage pail versus the recycling bin without feeling guilty.

Garbage that is burned to make steam for generating electricity includes the following:

- Biomass, or biogenic (plant or animal products), materials such as paper, cardboard, food waste, grass clippings, leaves, wood, and leather
- Most plastics and other synthetic materials made from petroleum and glass and metals

Producing electricity is only one reason to burn MSW. Burning waste also reduces the amount of

material that would probably be buried in landfills.

According to the U.S. Energy Information Administration, waste-to energy plants reduce 2,000 pounds of garbage to ash weighing about 300 to 600 pounds and they reduce the volume of waste by 87%.

When in doubt, throw it in the garbage pail. It will be converted to energy!

Items that should be placed in the Garbage include the following:

- Unwashed cans and bottles
- All plastics, except #1 & #2
- Plastic bags, straws, plastic chairs & toys
- Aluminum foil, plastic & metal cutlery
- Wire & plastic hangers
- **Batteries**
- Light bulbs
- Telephone books
- Styrofoam
- Soiled pizza boxes
- Coated cardboard (milk and juice containers)
- Plastic and paper food containers
