## LFD Rescues Resident from Burning Home

LFD performs CPR on house fire victim

Thanks to the efforts of the brave members of the Lynbrook Fire Department, a resident is in recovery following a house fire in the early morning of February 21st.

Fire was blowing out of a basement window at the Shipherd Avenue home, and the LFD was advised that someone may still be in the basement.

Working together, Chief of Department Michael Brooks, Third Assistant Chief Danny Ambrosio, and First Assistant Chief John Donald as well as Truck Company's Captain James DiGiambattista, Ex-Captain Scott Bien, and Firefighter James Merkel were able to remove the unconscious victim from the basement and pass the victim to the care of Medical Company personnel.

EMT/Ex Captain Janice Germain immediately began CPR with the assistance of EMT/Captain Kaitlin Curran and EMT/Lieutenant Kacie Curran.

The victim was transported to South Nassau Hospital



## **Police Awards**

On January 6th, members of Lynbrook's Finest were recognized by Mayor Beach, the Lynbrook Village Board, and Police Chief Brian Paladino for their outstanding work in making Lynbrook a safer place to live, work, and play. Below are illustrations of the bravery, quick thinking, professionalism, and enthusiasm that the Lynbrook Police Department personifies each and every day.

## Police Officer Chris Lopez: recipient of a Certificate of Exceptional Duty, four Letters of Recognition, and two Certificates of Merit

Thanks to Officer Lopez' remarkable work in assisting or investigating illicit drug activity at several Lynbrook residences, drug activity has ceased at three homes.

Additionally, he was awarded for observing a drug transaction where he was able to arrest the customer of a drug dealer. From that arrest, and with the assistance of Detective Harrison, Officer Lopez was able obtain information from the arrestee that enabled him to name, identify, and locate the drug dealer and arrest him, hours later.

He also showed exemplary bravery when he helped remove a resident from a fire on Smith St.

Finally, Officer Lopez was also recognized for a car stop initiated when he witnessed both the driver and passenger of a vehicle smoking from a marijuana cigarette. After a brief conversation and a pat down for weapons as an officer safety measure, Officer Lopez noticed a black back pack on the passenger side of the vehicle. He was given permission by the occupants of the vehicle to look into the bag. As he did this, the passenger fled causing a shutdown and search for the fleeing passenger in the area. Moments later Officer Lopez got a chance to look into the bag where he recovered a black Ruger 9MM hand gun. The driver was placed under arrest for this and the passenger who was able to be identified still remains at large.

### Police Officer Jean James: recipient of two Letters of Recognition

Officer James came to the aid of a female who was having difficulty breathing in a vehicle that was pulled over on Merrick Rd. Upon observing her condition, Officer James recognized that she was having an allergic reaction to something and administered a dose of epinephrine to her, providing her with immediate relief. Ambulance and hospital both commended Officer James on his diagnosis of the patient and his choice to administer the epinephrine.

Additionally, Officer James was assigned and first to respond to a medical aided case for a female choking at a private residence. Upon arriving, he found the woman lying on the floor, in a supine position, not breathing, with an apparent airway blockage. Officer James immediately identified the problem, scooped her off of the floor and administered multiple Heimlich abdominal thrusts causing the woman to expel a brussels sprout out of her throat. Thus, saving the woman's life.

### Police Officer Kevin Hoffman: Lifesaving Award

A trip to the movies for a father and his children turned traumatic as during the movie the 48-year old became unconscious. Audience members jumped into action and performed CPR. Soon after, Police Officers Kevin Hoffman and Jeff Burke took over the CPR and proceeded to deliver three shocks to the aided person's heart from their AED. The gentleman was transported to the hospital where he made a full recovery.

### Police Officer Robert Meier: Letter of Recognition

In late February/early March 2018 reports of graffiti, specifically the word "SERP" and a picture of a snake were spray painted on walls at several locations in Lynbrook.

On June 14th 2019, Officer Meier, while investigating a burglary observed the tag "SERP" spray painted on a wall in the rear yard of the property. Subsequently an interview was conducted with a young man who revealed a full confession to the all of the aforementioned graffiti incidents. He was placed under arrest for these crimes.

## Police Officers Brandon Lavista and Robert Campagna: Letter of Recognition

There are always be individuals looking to make a quick buck from stolen merchandise, and larcenies from vehicles are an easy way to do just that. On the night of December 19, 2019, Officer Lavista, along with some other members of the overnight tour came upon a suspicious male trying a door handle of a car on Surrey Commons. The subject fled and was subdued approximately 15 minutes later on Northumberland Gate where he resisted arrest, injuring two of Lynbrook's Finest in the struggle. Police Officer Lavista skillfully affected the arrest of the individual and recovered property stolen from numerous residences.

Also, on the same night Officer Campagna, along with fellow officers, found a male subject stealing items from cars in the Yorkshire section of the village. The subject, after being stopped, fled and was recaptured a few blocks away. When Officer Campagna attempted to arrest the individual, he began to fight him and the other officers, injuring two of them. He was eventually subdued and the stolen property was recovered and given back to their rightful owners.

#### Sgt. Anthony Falsitta: Letter of Recognition and a Certificate of Merit

While he was still a Police Officer, Sgt. Falsitta arrived at the scene of a vehicle that struck a tree on the shoulder of the westbound side of Sunrise Highway, he found the driver unconscious and unresponsive at the wheel, with the vehicle still running. In order to render aide to the man, Falsitta had to break the passenger window. He then discovered thousands of dollars in cash as well as illegal drugs throughout the vehicle and it was apparent that the driver was in the midst of a drug overdose. Narcan was immediately administered and the man regained consciousness. He was then transported to the hospital and was processed for arrest.

Additionally, Sgt. Falsitta led his men in assisting the victim of a house fire on Smith St. Police officers, along with Mayor Beach removed the resident from his home, which was fully engulfed in flames.

### Police Officers Peter Festa, Derek Buonora, Jon Stawinski: Letter of Recognition

On Wednesday, November 27, 2019 a serious car crash occurred on Sunrise Hwy near the intersection of Reyam Rd. Upon their arrival, Lynbrook Police Officers Peter Festa, Derek Buonora, and Jon Stawinski found a severely injured female, who witnesses said had just driven her sedan at a high rate of speed into the back of a box truck, lying in the left lane of west bound Sunrise Hwy just feet from her vehicle. She had just been extricated from her car by civilians seconds earlier. Recognizing that the crash scene was quickly deteriorating (because the sedan had just caught fire) and understanding that, without immediate medical attention, this woman was about to die, the trio lifted the victim together, moved her to a safe distance from the crash site, out of vehicle traffic and began medical lifesaving measures. Within moments, they were relieved by Northwell Ambulance and Lynbrook Fire Department personnel. They then went to work making enabling stopped traffic to flow again. As soon as the scene began to stabilize, Officer Stawinski was assigned to South Nassau Hospital and guard the patient, as is normal in a situation when someone is likely to die. He was met by the husband of the seriously injured woman, and took it upon himself to comfort him and act as a liaison between him and the medical staff. When the woman was transferred to Northwell Hospital in Manhasset to undergo specialized surgery, Officer Stawinski drove the distraught husband to Northwell and again situated him and comforted him at the hospital. Right now, the female victim is alive and rehabilitating in the hospital all thanks to the quick and decisive action of the civilians, police officers, and members of the Lynbrook Fire Department
